


To: LGBTQ+ Youth Allies Policymakers








"Being a trans youth in Arkansas, a very conservative state, often feels really bleak with all of the legislation that has been happening. It's really disheartening to see that in a place that you've grown up in your whole life."

"These attacks are coordinated and funded by some of the largest anti-LGBT organizations in this country. There's millions of dollars poured into lobbying and lining these legislators pockets while trans youth are struggling."

"It's always important to center the voices of the people that this legislation is going to impact the most. That's where we're going to gain the most insight on how to support trans youth now."





"What these systems tell us is that we're powerless. It's a very carceral, disposable-politics mindset. And so often we believe that and we allow ourselves to fall into that narrative. But we need to remember who benefits from me hating myself. The people that benefit are the people that don't want us to be here. So whenever you're having doubtful or self-hating thoughts towards yourself when it comes to your identity, the most important thing that you can do is realize your power and realize your truth and recognize that the only people that are benefiting from you hating yourself are the same people who we are fighting against."





"we're the future. We're what's next. And we are tired of seeing people older than us telling us what we can and cannot do."

"If these bills were definitely defeated, I wouldn't have to worry... I'd be living my best life. That's my freaking goal. Everyone would just dress however they want. Living and thriving."

"Allies should definitely show up for trans youth by listening to us. Have conversations with us. Emotionally be there for us. Protest with us... There is no LGBTQ movement without trans people. Pride wouldn't even exist if it wasn't for my people."





"As a black trans woman, a youth at that, I feel like it's important for me to figure out what I can do so I have the proper care and pathway to have the life that I want and that I've been desiring."

"It's getting difficult. We go through stereotypes and discrimination against our transitioning and our gender roles. We have the government trying to step in and take away rights that are beneficial to us and that our ours to begin with."

"I really just send out hope and pray that those who are having difficulty right now with trying to come out and live their best life, I pray that they find the light one day and they can have peace with being who they want to be."
