Breana's pronouns are she/her and she identifies as a Two Spirit youth.


She is a direct descendent of Crazy Horse's band, is an ancestral survivor of the Wounded Knee Massacre, and the product of Boarding School Survivor. She currently attends college at the Institute of the American Indian Arts and is the Associated Student Government President. She is pursuing her bachelor's degree in Fine Arts, specializing in acrylic painting, and minoring in Business & Entrepreneurship.

Breana is an active member of the International Indigenous Youth Council- Oglala Chapter and the GSA Network- Two Spirit Initiative. She is also a model for Indigenous fashion designers, elevating their brands and clothing. Breana has learned early, that she holds a passion for creating change to protect what is sacred to her through art, as a young Lakota wxman. She is a youth activist and uses her platform to advocate for MMIP (Missing or Murdered Indigenous Persons) epidemic, LandBack, Intergenerational Trauma, Environmental Justice issues, Indigenous Rights, and Two-Spirit visibility. Breana Brave Heart carries forward representing her community, and empowerment of liberation through Indigenous joy.


"Living with

After the passing of their maternal grandfather their mother placed Jamie in group art therapy for other young children grieving their grandparents. The act of making visual art quickly filled their days, with printmaking becoming their primary medium only in the past few years. Jamie is a graduate from Interlochen Arts Academy as an Interdisciplinary Arts major with concentrations in visual arts and creative writing. He loves his cat, traveling by train, making art, and spending time with his friends.


My family was here before the borders before the expansion & the holy orders I'm part of the many seeds
